Sullivan Landing, the nature-scape development in the Townsite part of Kimberley, was treated for its Invasive Plants in an eco-friendly way. Not only that, but the developer, Taryncroft Equities Ltd, treated the Invasive Plants before they got out of hand and that's "doing it right!" The goats had a meal of Spotted Knapweed, Blueweed and Dalmatian Toadflax.



Sullivan Landing distinguishes uniquely from other developments as Eco-friendly and naturally landscaped with native plants from the surrounding forests. There is much opportunity for the invasive and nuisance plants to move in on the bare ground, but Taryncroft has made sure that is not going to happen.



They have hired The Goats of Vahana Nature Rehabilitation to remove unwanted vegetation in a natural way and bring a balance to the growth coming in to the new neighbourhood.
